From the Pastor..

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

There is a passage from I Kings that has been much on my mind of late.

Then the word of the LORD came to Elijah, saying, Go now to Zarephath, which belongs to Sidon, and live there; for I have commanded a widow there to feed you. So he set out and went to Zarephath. When he came to the gate of the town, a widow was there gathering sticks; he called to her and said, "Bring me a little water in a vessel, so that I may drink." As she was going to bring it, he called to her and said, "Bring me a morsel of bread in your hand." But she said, "As the LORD your God lives, I have nothing baked, only a handful of meal in a jar, and a little oil in a jug; I am now gathering a couple of sticks, so that I may go home and prepare it for myself and my son, that we may eat it, and die." Elijah said to her, "Do not be afraid; go and do as you have said; but first make me a little cake of it and bring it to me, and afterwards make something for yourself and your son. For thus says the LORD the God of Israel: The jar of meal will not be emptied and the jug of oil will not fail until the day that the LORD sends rain on the earth." She went and did as Elijah said, so that she as well as he and her household ate for many days. The jar of meal was not emptied, neither did the jug of oil fail, according to the word of the LORD that he spoke by Elijah.

As we, from the major corporations of this nation to the federal government, to the state and local level on down to our individual households, worry about what the next day may bring, it is important to remember that God is with us. The widow of Zarephath and her son thought the end was on them. But because they were faithful to God's word spoken through the prophet, Elijah. There was always enough to get by. And maybe that is the lesson we as a society need to learn. That with God, there will be enough to get by.

We have a lot happening here at Saint Stephen's. I need to cut short

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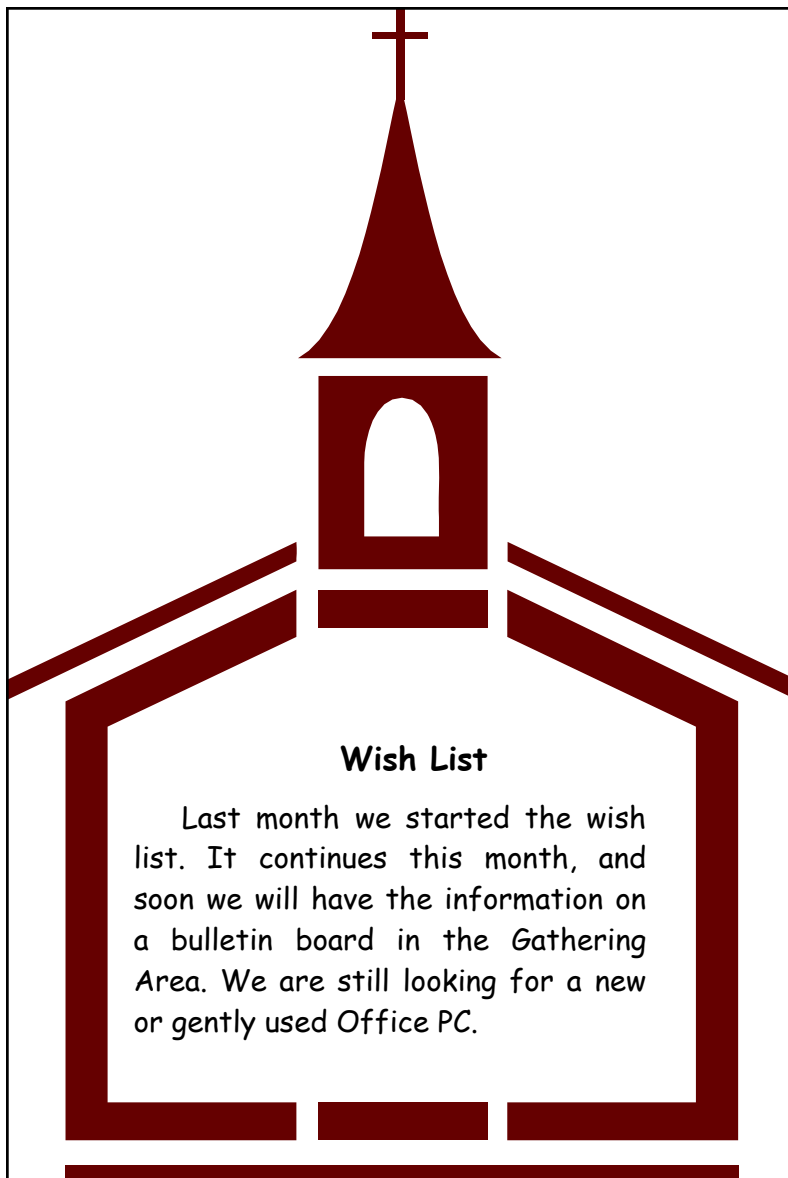

list.) It was a good year for St. Stephen's. 2008.

But now it is 2009. Many of the initiatives mentioned in the last paragraph, and more, are continuing into 2009.

- This past Saturday we hosted a fun and educational handbell seminar led by Kathleen Ebeling-Thorne of the Westminster Choir College.
- In the evening, an Epiphany Vesper Concert featured four excellent singers in a traditional evening prayer service.
- On February 28, another retreat will be held at the St. Francis Retreat Center to further examine teachings of the early church.

Every Month

- On the second Sunday we celebrate the Sunrise service
- On the 25th, we support the Emmanuel Dining Room in its effort to feed the hungry of Wilmington.
- On the 2nd and 4th Tuesday, we participate in the Downtown Bible Study
- On the 4th Wednesday, the Intercessory Prayer team meets to pray for those in need.
- And, perhaps it goes without saying, but I'll say it anyway, every week three worship services are offered.

There is plenty to look forward to during the next 12 months, yet there is a significant hurdle we're going to have to clear. Our budget.

Whether you attend services at St. Stephen's every week, or retain an affiliation through reading the Courier

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each month, you know it takes money to keep our doors open and the programs continuing.

In a few days, on Sunday, January 25, we will hold the second half of our annual Congregation Meeting. The major item of business will be approving our 2009 budget. Just weeks after we had a handle on 2008's budget. See how insidious the change of year is?

As of this *Courier's* deadline, our projected 2009 budget is not balanced. In round numbers, anticipated expenses are \$280,500. Pledges are currently at \$130,000. By including building use income and anticipated, unpledged funds — some folks always make offerings, but don't pledge them in advance — the income level to be presented to the congregation will be just over \$211,000.

This, obviously, is a big problem. Solving the problem means reducing our expenses and increasing our income. Unfortunately, we don't have the luxury of participating in the public feeding frenzy that our federal government leaders are staging in Washington, DC. Nope, we have to solve this ourselves.

From my position as Finance Committee liaison, I know that there is precious little fat in the budget. The basic necessities of salaries (Pastor, Music Director, Sexton, Office Coordinator and Communications Coordinator) and utilities make up 75% of the budget, and, given the present numbers, actually more than anticipated income. There is room for reducing our maintenance budget, but it will require volunteer talents of our congregation to do things for which we paid a contractor last year. Perhaps fuel costs will remain low for enough of the year to make a difference, but don't hold your breath.

We've also begun a "Wish List" of things needed for the office and buildings that, if donated, will provide some relief for our budget.

I believe income will make the difference. If you have already made a pledge for 2009, please consider increasing it. If you haven't yet submitted your pledge card, you'll find a pledge card in this issue of the *Courier* for your convenience. Non-pledged donations are equally welcome. It all helps close the budget gap.

St. Stephen's is asking for your help. If you come through, we'll be able to add the word "Happy" to the front of this column's title.

Following Vice President Biden's Helping Hands

Just as Vice President Biden has helped at Emmanuel Dining Room over the years, so has the congregation of St. Stephen's. For over twenty years we have had a long-standing commitment to provide food and servers on the 25th of each month (except December). We serve lunch at Emmanuel Dining Room East, which is located in the former Old Asbury Methodist Church, 226 North Walnut Street, at the corner of Third and Walnut Streets.

During the month of February we are asking you, the people of St. Stephen's, to help us collect food and funds in order to make our commitment for 2009. You have been very generous and we're starting the year with some food already in the closet and funds in the bank! Our current needs for the year are:

- 450 pounds of baked beans
- 300 pounds of applesauce
- \$775 for buying hot dogs

As the 6 to 7 pound cans of beans and applesauce are the cheapest — and also the most difficult to carry — we'd be happy to go buy them should you want to donate money rather than cans.

Each month volunteers are needed to make desserts and serve the meal. The sign-up sheet is in the gathering area. We need monthly:

- Four persons/families to each provide 50 deserts: cup cakes, brownies, cookies, and such. These can be homemade or store-bought.
- Three people to serve the meal from 12 to 1 on the 25th of the month.

Grace of God Lutheran Starts Grocery Club

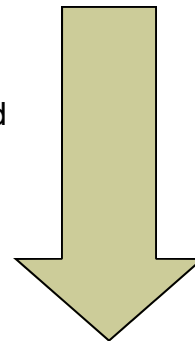
On December 30, 2008, Grace of God outside of Millsboro offered its first LCS Grocery Club distribution to its low income neighbors. Grace of God is the state's newest Lutheran Church. Under the guidance of Pastor Judy Moller-Gavlick it provides weekly worship services and more to the fast-growing Delaware coastal area north of Rehoboth. LCS grocery clubs provide food for a group of families on a monthly basis. Club members are not charged, but they are involved in food choices and food distribution. Grace of God is working toward acquiring its own site and building. Meanwhile it has offices and holds worship at the CHEER Center on Longneck Road. Food distributions take place at the American Legion Post 28 on Route 24. At the December 30 distribution, Grace of God provided 15 families – 27 adults and 40 children – with much needed groceries and spiritual support.

While the main focus of LCS has been on emergency food and housing assistance, the FAITH Center has had the flexibility to provide people with help for their utilities as well as funds for specialized clothing, tools and other back-to-work emergency needs. The merger was approved on 12/30/08. The "LCS FAITH Center" – as it is now known – and its two part-time employees will continue to operate from its location at 3rd and Walnut in Wilmington. The LCS FAITH Center thus becomes the 12th LCS service site. Support for its activities will continue to include contributions from over 15 Presbyterian, Methodist, Episcopal, Unitarian, and Catholic, churches, and the Society of Friends. This broad ecumenical backing is closely aligned with LCS's long-range plan of widening its support throughout the faith community.

FAITH Center Merges With LCS

LCS and the FAITH Center offer many similar crisis alleviation services for low income people in our area.

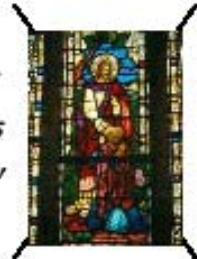

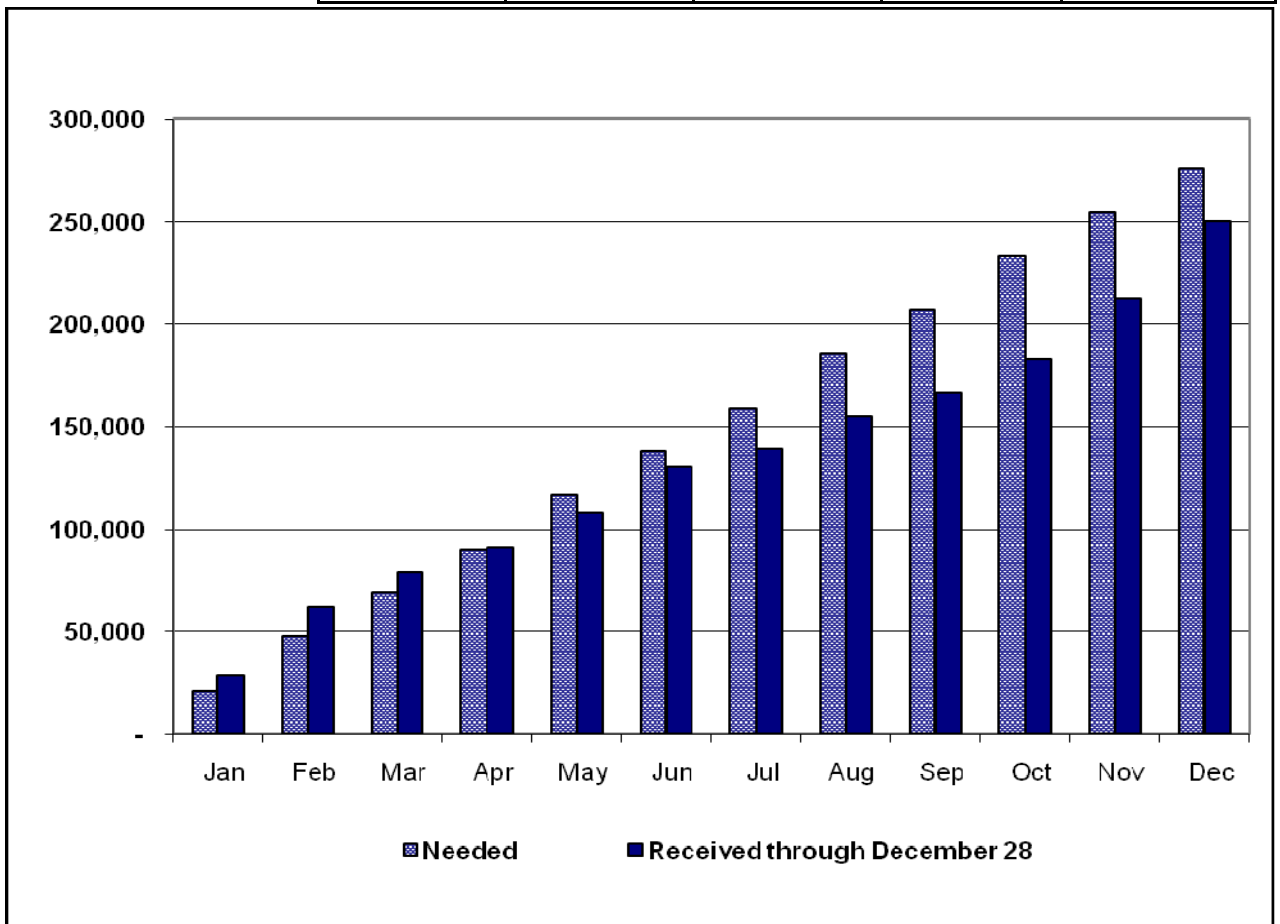
