Report of the Communications Coordinator/Office Administrator

2023 was a year marked by both continuity and change at St. Stephen's.

We connected with our community, both in person and online. Our livestream worship services reached a wider audience than ever before, with 1.2k views on YouTube, an increase of over 25% from 2022.

While watch time hours decreased slightly, this may reflect the return of some members to in-person worship.

On social media our Facebook posts reached 15,487 accounts and our Instagram posts reach 1,362 accounts. This includes tags, check ins and page profile visits.

Our second Peace of Pizza, an official Peace Week Delaware event, brought together our food pantry clients, church members, neighbors, and community



members for a shared meal, conversation and a concert performed by Cab Calloway School of the Arts students. Food pantry clients enjoyed the event and told me they felt welcomed and heard. Attendees said it was one of the best events they attended because of the conversation and engagement with so many different people. This was our 8th year participating in Peace Week Delaware, which brings together community organizations and people for an annual week of free events to promote harmony, equity and justice in our community.

We continued our "Concerts at St. Stephen's" series with organ and piano concerts, which brought Cab Calloway families and new people to our sanctuary.

Our food pantry continued to bring together many people in our community to volunteer and receive and donate food. We added a sandwich board sign outside to highlight the number of people receiving food

and to advertise our concerts. The sign has moved our neighbors to donate food especially around Thanksgiving and Christmas.

This year we said farewell to Interim Pastor Mark Walters who guided St. Stephen's as we emerged from the pandemic emergency and we welcomed our new pastor, The Rev. Susan Loney. Together

Pastor Sue and I have worked to update and streamline our website keeping in mind that the website is our virtual front door. Take a look when you get a chance!

I am deeply grateful for the dedication of our staff and volunteers who keep St. Stephen's running smoothly. Bonnie Kincaid, our Sexton, ensures the church is pristine and alerts us to any maintenance needs. Assistant Sexton Armand Schmidt and his coach Tony Hodge recycle mountains of cardboard and keep the grounds tidy.



Many thanks go to Pastor Mark Walters, Pastor Sue Loney, Council President Bob Linderman and all the members for their guidance and support. The Property Team regularly monitors repairs and meets with technicians. Carol Landry continues to handle all mailings from the weekly E-Courier to congregation wide ones. Bob Linderman keeps our communications error-free with his eagle eye proofreading.

I look forward to continue working with our members and community to fulfill our mission To Love, To Invite and To Serve in 2024.

Report of the Council

When reviewing this past year, of all of the activities our congregation was involved in, the one that stands out to me as the most significant was the change we experienced in pastoral leadership. We started the year with Pastor Mark Walters preaching and providing sound guidance as our interim pastor. While the Call Committee worked diligently to identify and select the right pastoral candidate to lead us into our future, Pastor Mark kept us on sound footing with his positive energy, his inciteful sermons, his shared wisdom, and his genuine desire and ability to shepherd us through the interim period.

In April, the Call Committee, led by Karleen Strayer, with dedicated members Michael Farthing, Matt Johnson, Claire Morse, Betty Sperati, and Leah Strayer, presented their recommendation to the Congregation Council. After a lengthy interview with the candidate, the Council members voted unanimously to recommend Pastor Susan Loney to the congregation for approval as our next full-time pastor.

On May 7, the congregation was led in worship by Pastor Sue who preached what is known in the parlance as her "Call Sermon." After worship, the congregation voted in a special meeting to extend a Call to her as our pastor and she accepted.

On July 9, Pastor Mark preached his last sermon as our interim pastor and, directly after worship, we celebrated his ministry at St. Stephen's. The next day Pastor Sue started her ministry with us.

Throughout the process of searching for a new pastor, our congregation continued to be blessed with the right people in the right place at the right time. From pastoral leadership to congregational leadership, to members willing to take on additional responsibilities, to dedicated support staff members, and to helpful friends and volunteers, our small, yet strong, community of believers did much more than just "keep the lights on."

That thought leads into the recognition of other important parts of our ministry mission this past year:

- Peace of Pizza Under the leadership of Michele Torchia and Rick Feltman, with many volunteer helpers, we served free pizza, ice cream, and beverages to 130 neighbors and friends as part of Peace Week Delaware. The Tap Room Trio provided live jazz to our guests.
- The Concert series Under the direction of our Music Director, Claudio Espejo, with support



from our music team of Ann Warner, Ann Dransfield and Betty Sperati, a special concert was performed in the sanctuary on the third Sunday of all but the summer months. The free concerts provided outstanding musicianship and were attended by many members and outside guests.

- LCS Food Pantry Under the direction of our office administrator, Kanchalee Reeves, the pantry served in excess of 28,600 people this past year.
- Abundant Life Faith Center this small congregation continues to hold their Sunday worship services in our sanctuary directly after our worship service is over.
- New Jerusalem Missionary Baptist Church this small congregation continues to use space in our former Sunday School building to hold their Sunday worship services.
- Bootless Stageworks this eclectic band of thespians continues to offer a number of theatrical performances in our former social hall.
- Emmanuel Dining Room Under the leadership of Ken and Debbie Nicholson, we continued to provide food for the EDR ministry of meals to the needy.
- Hilltop Lutheran Neighborhood Center generous members and friends provided



the Center with backpacks for young students, baskets of food accessories for Thanksgiving meals for families, and Christmas gifts for young children.

• Building maintenance and upkeep - Numerous repair projects were completed under the direction of John Rodammer and Betty Sperati.

I continue to be deeply moved by the dedication of so many members and staff who work tirelessly to support our congregation. With Pastor Sue's strong leadership, we are all pulling in the same direction to live out our mission TO Love, TO Invite, and TO Serve.

Altar Guild

Altar Guild is responsible for the care of the worship space. This includes the placement of the furnishings, appointments and ornaments used during the worship service and assisting with communion. Altar Guild members, with the help of non-members, also decorate the Sanctuary for high holy days, such as Christmas and Easter.

Our group is small - we only have four members. One person is assigned each Sunday, and they are on a four-week rotation. The responsibilities are not difficult. Property Team

Over the past several months, Willie McGrath was hired and has completed many renovations to our church.

- He and his crew completed altar renovations and painting. Then, he completed more work in the sanctuary where there was rotted masonry work at the exit door, demo rotted plaster around exit door, top and both sides, back wall where window is, scrapped plaster around the church-stained glass windows. Willie also sealed cracks on the plaster around the walls.
- Willie patched walls with plaster/stucco and two coats of finish paint to match the rest of sanctuary. Concrete molding was tightened with extra-strength plaster. A stain blocker was applied to the wall where the wooden ceiling leaked and ran down existing walls.
- The two HVAC units that serve the food pantry were replaced in May. LCS contributed \$10,000 to St. Stephen's which was used to defray costs.
- Lights were also replaced in the sanctuary with LED lights. They should last longer and require less electricity.
- Willie removed the leaves from down-spouts and roof that were caused by neighbor's trees.
- Work was completed on the upstairs room by the fire escape that had a major roof leak, rotting ceiling and floor.
- Hoopes performed our annual fire extinguisher inspection. We were certified for another year.
- Sobieski worked to resolve smoke detector and alarm issues. The programming on the fire alarm panel was upgraded so it will automatically reset after a power outage.
- Tree and bush pruning were completed outside pastor's office and light poles.
- The timer for outside light at Chapel area door was replaced.
- State inspected our boilers and pressure vessel. They passed for another year.
- Yellow curbs were repainted for the drive-through area.
- Removal of items from the Pastor's office was completed so that the carpet could be stretched.
- Mounting screws on the vestibule double doors were replaced so they would securely latch.
- The broken faucet in the kitchenette was replaced.
- Repaired bathroom water issues.
- Placed signs on 13th St for dog walkers to curb their dogs.
- As Bootless received new chairs, we donated 48 bucket chairs to Sojourners Place.
- The sprinkler system had its annual inspection and passed.
- Bootless received permission to disconnect gas and capping the supply pipe. Also, the electricity was cut off and secured the supply line. The stove was removed from the kitchen.



- Gary Gooden has been working with our landscaping crew so that everything on the grounds is maintained.
- Home Paramount completed a termite inspection. None were found.

Service Assistants

There are three positions filled each Sunday which help our mission TO love, TO Invite and TO serve.

Assisting Minister assists the pastor during the service. They read prayers and readings and help with the distribution of communion. If you might be interested in participating a little, but not helping with everything, we can arrange for you to read one or two readings. We can also schedule you if you might be available to read during some of our special services such as Good Friday and Lessons and Carols.

Camera operator runs the live stream camera. Once you figure out what needs to be plugged in where, it's not a challenging job. We have one camera, with a number of presets to make it easy to show various parts of the sanctuary. There were some sound system challenges during 2023, but they have hopefully been worked out.

Usher. This person is the first person that people interact with as they arrive at church. They pass out bulletins, direct people during communion, and ensure that visitors are greeted and given any information they need. The Usher is also responsible for collecting the offering and bring it up front for a blessing.

Food Pantry

2023 was marked by the end of the pandemic health emergency in May and an uptick in the number of families in need of food.

The end of the pandemic meant SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program) also known as food stamps were reduced to pre-pandemic levels and resulted in deep cuts to many families who had been receiving the maximum benefit. Families also had to reapply to receive benefits. Some missed the deadline. Others were missing information or had procedural errors. This led to new families and families we hadn't seen since 2019.

In 2023, we served 12,558 households. Of those households, 1,848 were new. Those households equaled 28,653 people – 19,465 adults and 9,188 children. This was a 46% increase from 2022 when we served 19,567 people. We are seeing more families who speak Spanish, Arabic, and other languages. Kristie Augenblick put together pictures of food so our volunteers can communicate options better. We also use Google Translate.

In addition to serving families in the food pantry, we participated in a Food Bank of Delaware program which delivered food to Wilmington residents through DoorDash. The program focused on clients who could not come to a local food pantry because they were homebound or disabled. Lutheran Community Services ended the program in December 2023 because it took a significant time away from our volunteers' ability to serve St. Stephen's pantry clients. In the two years we were part of the program more than 6,000 meal boxes were delivered.

In May we started receiving fresh produce deliveries under the Local Farm Purchase Assistance Cooperative Agreement Lutheran Community Services has with the Delaware Department of Agriculture. LCS is one of only two nonprofits in the state to receive fresh food from Delaware farmers over the next several years. Under the agreement, we also receive fresh eggs and meat every week. Our clients have been thrilled to receive food from Delaware farmers, especially the eggs and chicken breasts, turkey bacon and pork tenderloin. These are items we could not order from the Food Bank of Delaware.

Through a partnership with the Food Bank of Delaware, Donate Delaware, and a formula company, we are

distributing free baby formula. We are one of several organizations that have been distributing 44,000 large cans of powder formula. Families do not need to register to receive formula.

Our volunteers are the heart of the food pantry. They serve all our clients with kindness and compassion. In addition to volunteers who work in the food pantry, we have volunteers who pick up food rescue from Acme Trolley Square and Sprouts Farmers Market every weekday and volunteers who stock the pantry on Monday evenings. Last year they served 5,246 hours.

We're grateful for our community partners. In 2023, Sprouts Farmers Market and Acme Trolley Square. donated 54,617 pounds of food and



other items which would have been thrown away. Sprouts also continued their Grab 'N Give campaign this year. Customers paid \$12.99 to donate a discounted bag of cereal, macaroni and cheese and Larabars.

The Junior League of Wilmington donates thousands of period supplies from September to May. Sanitary pads and tampons are not covered by food stamps or WIC so it's a huge help to our families to have these available. In the summer months we rely on donations from the community.

Hagley Museum donated hundreds of pounds of heirloom garden vegetables. We received everything from crookneck squash to lettuce to heirloom tomatoes. The gardens are kept as they appeared during E.I. du Pont's time in the 1800s.

The University of Delaware Cooperative Extension taught a six-week nutrition class for clients.

We have strong support from local schools. Tatnall School, Tower Hill School and Wilmington Friends School hold food drives for the pantry. Tower Hill also donates books their students no longer need. All three schools have students who volunteer in the pantry during days of service. We started a new partnership with Salesianum School. Students who need community service hours volunteer on Monday and Wednesday evenings.

We're grateful for the generous support from churches. Members and friends of the Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd donated 2,500 pounds of fresh garden vegetables. They have been donating fresh produce from the Shepherd's Community Garden since 2017. Our clients love the variety of fresh vegetables from the Shepherd's

Garden. Good Shepherd also hosts a food and toiletry drive for the food pantry almost every month. Good Shepherd has a member who volunteers weekly.

St. Philip's donated 360 macaroni and cheese packages as part of their "Summer of Service" project. The women's book club also donates adult diapers. They also have two members who volunteer weekly.

St. Mark's hosted a food and toiletry drive and has six members who volunteer weekly.

Church of the Holy City donates nonperishable food monthly and Holy Trinity Greek Orthodox Church donates nonperishable food weekly. Holy Trinity has two members who volunteer weekly.



We continue to have regular donors who ask me each week what we need. They help to fill in the gaps from the Food Bank, especially the need for diapers.

We're grateful for the monthly nonperishable food donations from St. Stephen's.

Thank you for your generosity and for making a difference in the lives of families in need!

Hilltop Lutheran Neighborhood Center

2023 was a year of success for Hilltop Lutheran Neighborhood Center. We were able to maintain enrollment, retain and hire new staff, increase pay and provide bonuses for staff. We also provided bonuses for staff who retired with 20 years or more of service again this year. We began a capital improvement campaign to provide additional classrooms, meetings spaces and a full-size gym. Several staff enrolled in higher education through The Early Childhood Innovation Center (ECIC) program at Delaware State University.

The Reverend Clarence and Helen Pettit Scholarship Program continued to thrive. Three recipients received scholarships totaling \$5,000. Kiah Spinks, a former Hilltop participant, became a judge in Virginia. Dr. Daman Harris, former Hilltop participant, wrote a book and is scheduled to have a book signing at Hilltop in March 2024. Our deputy director was named the Community Father of the Year by Every Man Counts Foundation. Our executive director successfully defended her dissertation.

Health and mental health were big topics at Hilltop in 2023. A certified clinical health coach and a licensed massage therapist were brought in bi-weekly for staff. A wellness room was created for staff and families. Mental health was also incorporated for our early childhood education participants. This was done through a Music, Movement, and Mindfulness program that was instructed to give children the tools to handle BIG emotions.

We would not have been able to achieve the 2023 successes without the ongoing and increased support received from various donors and sponsors. The State of Delaware through Purchase of Care, Department of Education - State Funded Early Care and Education (formerly known as ECAP), New Directions Early Head Start (University of Delaware) and the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) continued to be major contributors to agency operations. Our long-standing partnerships with New Directions Early Head Start (NDEHS) and the Department of Education-State Funded Early Care and Education (formerly known as ECAP), allowed us to continue providing comprehensive services to participants from infant to five years old and their families. Funding from the United Way of Delaware and Grant in Aid continued to support and enhance our after-school and evening programs and services for youth. Programs included literacy, free haircuts, DJ workshops, cooking and percussion classes and Vacation Bible School.

Funding from the Lutheran churches continued to enable us to provide medical benefits for full-time staff and assistance to families in need. Lutheran church members provided more than 300 Thanksgiving baskets for Hilltop staff, families, and greater community, as well as Christmas gifts for all Hilltop participants. Funding from Herb and Marie Bollman continued to be vital to programming offered at Hilltop in 2023.

We look forward to continued success in 2024.

Lutheran Campus Ministry at the University of Delaware

It's a joy and privilege to work with the amazing, gifted, and inspiring students of LCM! Amid challenging times in the wider world, our students give me hope as they serve generously, prioritize their faith, and engage respectfully with tough questions. Tuesday evening gatherings remain the core of our program, with wonderful, home-cooked dinners and desserts provided by local parishioners, alumni, and board members, as well as meaningful worship times. Worship activities and topics during the year have included the popular Human Continuum exercise; sharing faith items; Lenten and Holy Week worship; discussions about Scripture, prayer, worry, blessing, and faith; candle-lighting for All Saints' Day; and Advent worship. In addition, we've been journeying through the Gospel of Luke together.

In the area of service, students have continued to volunteer with FISH, *Fellowship in Serving the Hungry*. FISH is a wonderful cooperative outreach to Newark area families facing food insecurity, together with committed volunteers from St. Paul's Lutheran Church. LCM has enjoyed many social activities over the past year: *UDairy* ice cream runs, Easter dinner, a spring retreat to Bethany Beach (which included a service project), informal monthly get-togethers for coffee and conversation, a fall retreat to Ocean City, Maryland (along with other synod campus ministries), a fall bonfire at a senior's home, a "Friendsgiving" meal, an Advent brunch, and a joyous Advent Party (pictured below.)

LCM held two fundraisers this year, an online version in early February and our first in-person event in four years in November, the latter graciously hosted by Hope Lutheran Church. Student leaders and board members offered beautiful testimonials, Bishop Bill Gohl kept us laughing, we raised welcome support for LCM, and a good time was enjoyed by all! We're so grateful for the generous support of our synod, local congregations, and individuals: alumni, local parishioners, parents, and other friends of this ministry. Thank you for sharing the vision of LCM!

The LCM students love to bless other organizations, as they vote how to steward annual interest from our ministry's endowment fund. This year's gift recipients included Bear Creek Lutheran Camp and Lutheran Disaster Response.

Give us the ability to adapt to the cultural, economic and social changes that occur in the neighborhoods we serve.


Receive our prayer, O God.
